

Marin Photography Club - Presidents' Letter

It is interesting to follow the change in photography as the preferred method of display has moved from prints to projected images. It used to be that prints were the dominant method of displaying photography, when they were easier to share (try sending someone a slide!) and better quality. Now, with everything digitized and the rise of social media for sharing images, prints are receding as the display media of choice:

This despite the fact what that many people consider quality of prints to be superior (especially compared to Instagram) and print makers have more control over how the image is displayed. With a projected image the maker is at the mercy of the match of the calibration of the maker's computer and monitor, and the viewer's computer and screen, which too often is not good. With a print the maker is in total control of creating a perfect image.

Our club has mirrored this trend. Prints participation has dropped 10% from 48% in 2012 to 38% in 2016. This drop is after, in 2012, restricting projected images to 3 vs 4 images per person in each projected competition

It was excellent to see at April's print competition 117 entries, which is the most since 2010 or before (we don't have good records before 2010). We hope this will continue as prints represent a powerful media for a photographer to present their artistic vision

Don't forget this year's Presidents theme of <u>"Bridges"</u>. In another month or so the fog will be back, presenting many opportunities for some wow pictures of-bridges. Of course with so many pictures of the Golden Gate Bridge, the bar is pretty high to get a picture that grabs your attention. Luckily there are many bridges in the Bay Area (BridgeHunter (https://bridgehunter.com/ca/marin/) lists 21 other bridges in Marin alone) and around the world.

Discovering Varanasi, India.

It is impossible to be indifferent to India. One is either completely enthralled or utterly overwhelmed, and quite possibly both at the same time. It is a country of wild extremes, physically, economically, culturally, visually, and for many travelers, emotionally.

Varanasi was probably the highlight of our recent trip to India. Mark Twain said Varanasi "is older than history, older than tradition, older even than legend, and looks twice as old as all of them put together." It isn't for the faint-hearted, but we found it enthralling. Foreign and Indian tourists, backpackers, religious pilgrims, and the assortment of humanity on display in Varanasi make it a must-see. For a rather sensationalistic take on Varanasi, watch the recent CNN episode of "The Believers".



If you are not familiar with it, Varanasi is the holiest city of Hinduism. Very old terraces of stones steps/slabs, called ghats, line the west side of the sacred Ganges River for 7 kilometers, where Hindu pilgrims perform rituals cleansing the mind, body, and soul. Labyrinthian alleys wind back from the ghats, deeper into perhaps the oldest continuously

inhabited city on earth. Cobbled and crowded, it is hard to avoid the cow dung, and being sacred, cows are everywhere.

The most famous (or perhaps to westerners, infamous) sights in Varanasi are the burning ghats. On two ghats, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, bodies are cremated. Not out of sight, but on the steps, in full view of anyone. We saw



bodies coming into town on top of cars and SUVs, the electric orange of the shrouds grabbing our attention even in the insane traffic. <u>read more......</u>

This year you can also enter online and not have to drop the form off at the office or put in the mail. Those instructions are included.


